Did You Know...That one of every three bites of food we eat is made possible by pollinators?

Pollinators are our partners in farming and gardening!

- **Pollinators are animals**—like bees, butterflies, and beetles—that carry pollen between flowers of the same species, fertilizing them. The flowers turn into fruits, nuts, and vegetables like bell peppers and cucumbers.
- **Pollinator Week** happens every June to raise awareness of the critical services they provide...but pollinators work for us year round! www.pollinator.org

Do pollinators need our help?



- **Pollinator populations are struggling** because of many factors: Pesticide misuse, habitat loss, invasive plant introductions, and pests and disease.
- **U.S. beekeepers have lost over 50%** of their honeybee colonies in the last ten years.

What can we do?

- **Always follow label instructions** when you apply pesticides. This helps pollinators AND people stay safe!

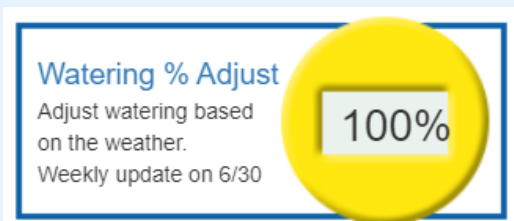

Treated Wood is Now Accepted for Disposal at County Transfer Stations

Do you need to unload old decking, railroad ties, fence posts, or other **landscaping features made from treated lumber**? The chemical preservatives in treated lumber (like chromium, arsenic, and copper) make it **unsafe to put in your trash or recycling bin**—but now you can leave it at the South Coast or Santa Ynez Valley Recycling and Transfer Stations!

Drought? Drat!

On July 8, the State of California extended emergency drought declarations to our county. We join 49 other counties (of 58 total) in the emergency declaration. Home gardeners, agricultural operations, & commercial operations are **asked to voluntarily reduce water use by 15%**. ([Santa Barbara News-Press, July 9, 2021](#))

So, what is a gardener to do?

Sonoma County is in the same (grounded) boat we are. Here's what UC Master Gardeners there have to offer:

1. **Add plants to your garden in the fall or winter**, when temperatures are cooler and new plants can get established with less water.
2. **Apply 2"-3" of mulch around garden trees & plants** to keep water from evaporating out of the soil.
3. **Prioritize mature landscaping plants and fruit trees** when irrigating. One deep irrigation weekly is better than several shallow applications.
4. **Avoid over-fertilizing**. The more plants grow, the more water they need!
